## **Opinion**

We have audited the financial statements of Avangrid Foundation, Inc. (a charitable foundation), which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Avangrid Foundation, Inc. as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

# **Basis for Opinion**

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. # NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2021 AND 2020

## NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Nature of Activities

The Avangrid Foundation, Inc. (the Foundation) receives funding from the various subsidiaries of Avangrid, Inc. In addition, the Foundation earns investment income from rental properties and marketable securities. After paying various expenses related to the rental activities, the Foundation distributes monies to charitable organizations at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

#### Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements are presented using the accrual method of accounting, recognizing revenues as earned and expenses as incurred.

#### **Basis of Presentation**

The financial statements are presented in accordance with Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standard Codification (ASC) 958-205, *Not-for-Profit Entities, Presentation of Financial Statements*. During 2018, the Foundation adopted the provisions of Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2016-14: *Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958) Presentation of Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Entities*, which improves the current net asset classification and the related information presented in the consolidated financial statements and notes about the Foundation's liquidity, financial performance, and cash flows.

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the Statements of Cash Flows, the Foundation considers all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

#### Property and Depreciation

Property additions and improvements are stated at cost; donated property is stated at fair market value at the date of receipt as determined by an outside appraisal. Expenditures for additions, renewals and betterments are capitalized; expenditures for maintenance and repairs are charged to expenses as they are paid. Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

## NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

#### **Revenue Recognition**

The Foundation recognizes contributions when cash, securities or other assets; an unconditional promise to give; or a notification of a beneficial interest is received. Conditional promises to give - that is, those with a measurable performance or other barrier and a right of return - are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend have been met.

In May 2014, the Financial Accounting Standards Board issued Accounting Standards Update ASU No. 2014-09, *Revenue from Contracts with Customers* (Topic 606). The ASU, and all subsequently issued clarifying ASUs replaced most existing revenue recognition guidance in U.S. GAAP. The ASU also required expanded disclosures relating to the nature, amount, timing, and uncertainty of revenue and cash flows arising from contracts with customers. The Foundation adopted the new standard effective January 1, 2019. Analysis of various provisions of this standard resulted in no significant changes in the way the Foundation recognizes revenue, and therefore no changes to the previously issued audited financial statements were required on a retrospective basis. The presentation and disclosures of revenue have been enhanced in accordance with the standard.

#### Net Assets

Net assets without donor restrictions are available for use at the discretion of the Board of Directors for general operating purposes. As of December 31, 2021 and 2020, the Foundation did not have any net assets with donor restrictions.

#### Income Tax Status

The organization is a private foundation as defined under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 Section 501(c)(3) and is subject to an annual excise tax on net investment income, including net realized gains. The actual excise tax on net investment income was approximately \$2,800 and \$3,400 for the years ending December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

The Internal Revenue Code requires that certain minimum distributions be made in accordance with a specified formula. As of December 31, 2021, the Foundation had approximately \$15,000,000 in excess distributions, which may be used to satisfy future distribution requirements.

#### Events Occurring After Reporting Date

The Foundation has evaluated events and transactions that occurred between December 31, 2021 and June 23, 2022, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued, for possible disclosure in the financial statements.

#### NOTE 2 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

The Foundation maintains cash and cash equivalent deposits with various institutions. Certain funds are insured up to \$250,000 per institution by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, while other funds are insured by the Securities Investor Protection Corporation up to \$500,000 per institution. At December 31, 2021, the Foundation's uninsured cash and cash equivalents totaled approximately \$2,960,000.

## NOTE 3 - LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY OF RESOURCES

The following reflects the Foundation's financial assets as of the statement of financial position date which are available within one year for general expenditures:

As part of the Foundation's liquidity management plan, cash in excess of daily requirements are invested in money market funds. At December 31, 2021 and 2020, no funds have been restricted by donors or designated by the board of directors. The Foundation does not maintain a line of credit.
